

Notes for Critiquing Sessions

To help you provide effective feedback, here are some things to consider while you read over a submission:

- 1. What did you like about this piece?
- 2. How did it make you feel?
- 3. Opening: Did it grab you? Did the story start at the right place?
- 4. Conflict: Emotional conflict? External conflict?
- 5. Plot:
 - a) Clear, and believable?
 - b) Clearly defined problem to solve?
 - c) Setting determined early enough (time & place)?
 - d) All scenes necessary to the plot?
 - e) Flashbacks: Too many? Did they break your attention?
 - f) Too many subplots?
 - g) Pacing?
- 6. Setting: Convincing & well drawn?
- 7. Characterization:
 - a) Did the people seem real?
 - b) Were the facts about them consistent?
 - c) Were the characters complex enough?
 - d) Did the protagonist undergo some change?

8. Ending: Did conflict & tension come to a reasonable ending? Resolution? Were you satisfied?

9. Sense Details: Show vs tell? Too much abstract language? Do we get the chance to interpret what the characters were feeling, or did the author just tell us directly?

10. Dialogue: Too much? Too little? Believable for the character? Accents, diction, vocabulary, rhythm of speech?

11. Point of View: Consistent, and correct?

12. Style and Language: How did it affect you, and add/detract from the writer's intention?

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
